


Medical cannabis and over-the-counter CBD are not the same

It has been over four years since the UK government introduced a law change to enable cannabis to be legally prescribed for medicinal use.

## **Medical Cannabis**

The majority of cannabis-based medicinal products (CBMPs) are unlicensed medicines that have to be prescribed as 'specials'. This means they can only be prescribed by GMC registered specialist doctors once licensed options have either been exhausted or deemed unsuitable.



As medicinal products, CBMPs are regulated by the Medicines and Healthcare products Regulatory Agency (MHRA); the organisation responsible for ensuring the safety, quality, and effectiveness of medicines in the UK



CBMPs are complex as the two main compounds in cannabis – CBD and THC – can be combined in many different ratios and concentrations, along with other compounds from the whole plant. This allows treatment to be tailored to a patient's needs. CBD and THC act on different receptors within the human body, producing separate effects. While there is some evidence supporting the use of CBD alone for conditions such as anxiety¹, incorporating THC appears to be more beneficial in others, including chronic pain.²

### **Medical Cannabis Clinics**

Clinics have been set up in the UK for managing symptoms of medical conditions which may benefit from CBMPs. These include chronic pain and psychiatric disorders such as insomnia, depression, and anxiety. Patients can either self-refer to these clinics or be referred by their doctor. In these clinics, doctors with experience in prescribing CBMPs can assess whether a trial is suitable, and if so, help patients find the right dose of CBD and/or THC needed to manage the symptoms of their condition.

#### Over-the counter CBD

In parallel, over-the-counter (OTC) CBD products have gained popularity in recent years and can be purchased without a prescription in pharmacies or online.



However, these are not medicinal products as they are regulated by the Food Standards Agency (FSA).



In order to be exempt from MHRA control, OTC CBD products must contain no more than 0.3% THC. A study published by the US National Institute of Health, however, found that products are often mislabelled, with 69% not containing the amount of CBD claimed, and THC being detected in 21% of samples. The study also revealed that some of the products failed laboratory testing for heavy metals, yeast, and mould.<sup>3,4</sup>
